# Combating global health inequity

through scalable solutions that expand healthcare access in the world's most challenging settings.



In the second quarter of 2022, we've witnessed how communities around the world are responding to rising political instability, widespread food insecurity, and global resource scarcity.

Through our mobile health teams in East Africa, we've also witnessed the transformative impact of community-led healthcare as a tool to combat health inequity.


There is no *one size fits all* approach to expanding healthcare in complex settings. Our program aimed at empowering Kenyan girls through healthcare access and medical education included community fairs and soccer matches. A thousand miles away our health workers in Somalia face heartbreak every day, treating the effects of famine and severe malnutrition among the vulnerable communities they serve.

In the midst of our most difficult challenges, we continue to make meaningful progress towards delivering healthcare to patients at the last mile. This report is a reminder that whatever we do, we do together.

In the face of seemingly impossible humanitarian challenges, we are fueled and empowered by the generous people who support our lifesaving work. As our community of supporters continues to grow, we will continue to make a difference in the lives of our patients. And again, we will do it *together*.

As devastating droughts and rising food insecurity threaten Somalia, more than 3 million people have been displaced in the East African nation.

Our Somali mobile health teams are reporting cases of severe malnutrition and dehydration, highlighting the need for rapid and responsive healthcare for these vulnerable populations. As the crisis in Somalia worsens, we renew our commitment to providing lifesaving health services to people in the most need.

# Reducing HIV Incidence and Stigma

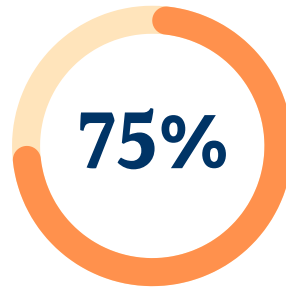
## THE ACADEMY
