The third quarter is always difficult for The Addis Clinic from a fundraising perspective. We get it. Most families are spending time on summer vacations and getting back into the rhythms of school. Turmoil and uncertainty in the financial markets, the Federal Reserve raising rates, and the upcoming elections created an environment where we had to tighten our belts a little bit more this third quarter.

Over the last few years, however, we have grown significantly. We have increased the size of our budget, board, and staff. Most importantly, we have increased the number of people we help and heal daily.

80,000 people have daily access to telemedicine through their local provider 2,000 people have daily text messages to help them with their HIV treatment plan 9,600+ people have an embedded clinical officers visiting a refugee camp or orphanage daily

Despite the dip in fundraising activity over the last three months, we have continued to serve patients at the last mile. We're entering the end of the year with all of the past year's success stories to fuel our best fundraising performance ever.


For many of the underserved persons we serve, this is the first time they've been able to speak to a healthcare worker in a safe and confidential setting.



# Patients in Somalia

As devastating droughts and rising food insecurity threaten Somalia, more than 3 million people have been displaced in the East African nation.

Our Somali mobile health teams are reporting cases of severe malnutrition and dehydration, highlighting the need for rapid and responsive healthcare for these vulnerable populations. As the crisis in Somalia worsens, we renew our commitment to providing lifesaving health services to people in the most need.





## Reducing HIV Incidence and Stigma

More than 1.5M people in Kenya live with HIV. With the support of our incountry partners, we've deployed a multi-regional messaging program that provides safe and confidential HIV education, medication reminders, and provide community resources for people living with HIV.
